

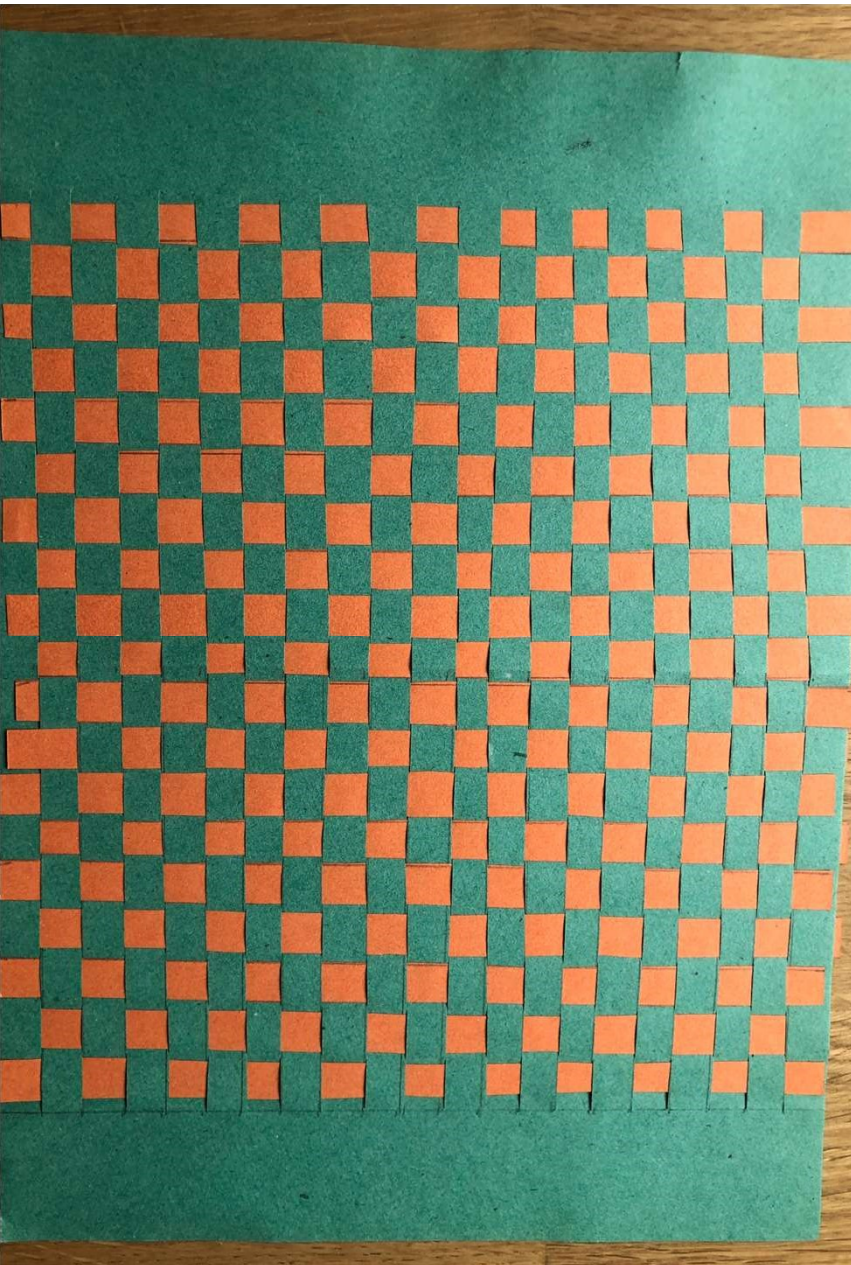
# Weaving with Paper: Patterns

### **Tabby or plain weave**

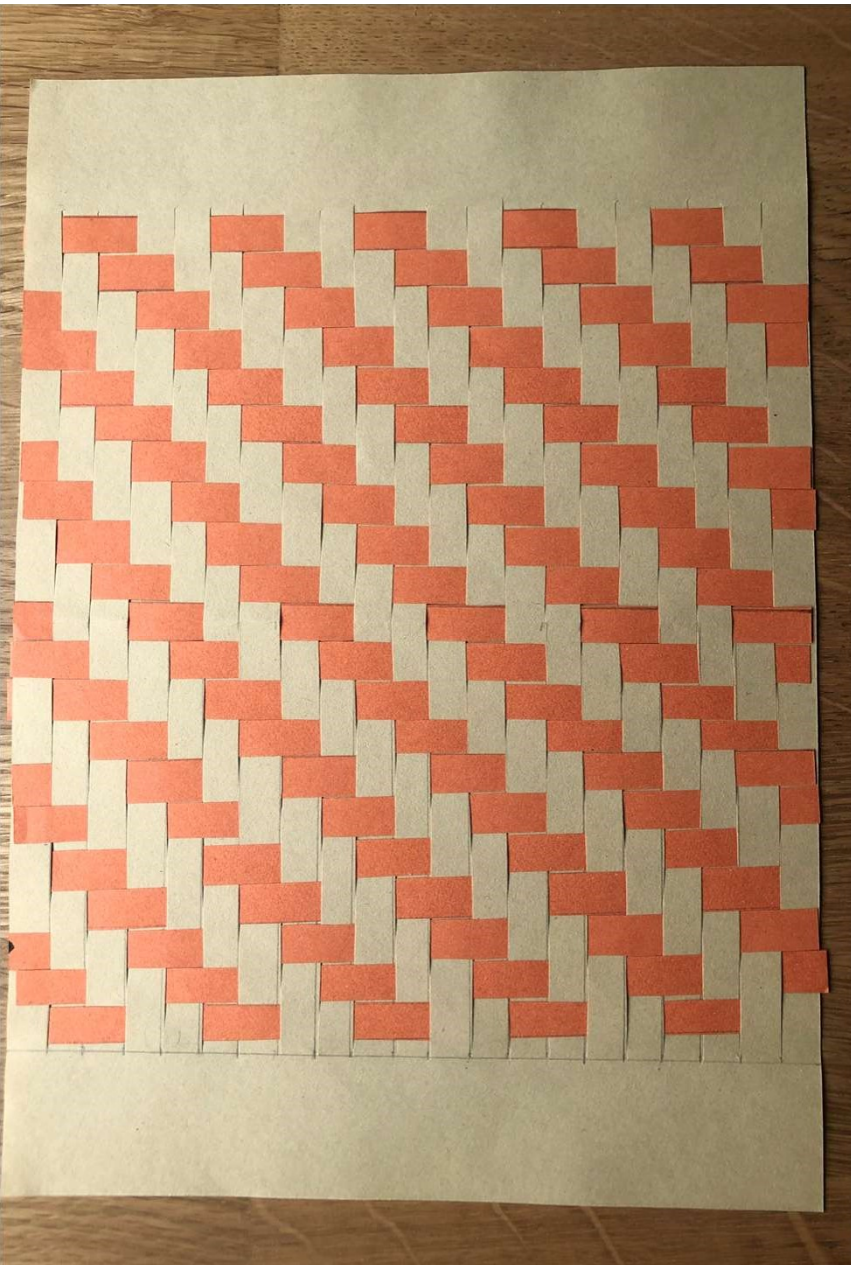
This is the easiest type of weaving, alternating the warp (vertical) and weft (horizontal) yarns to produce a basic woven texture.

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A = Over one, under one and repeat

B = Under one, over one and repeat

**Alternate rows A and B** until you run out of space



## Twill weave

Twill **weave** involves going under two warp yarns and then over the next two, and offsetting each following row by one warp yarn to produce a diagonal effect.

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A = **under two, over two** and repeat

B = (over one), \* **under two, over two** and repeat from \*

C = **over two, under two** and repeat

D = (under one), \* **over two, under two** and repeat from \*

Weave in this order: **A, B, C, D** and repeat





## Diamond weave

This is the most complex type of weaving shown here, with four **different** rows, used in a six-row repeat to form a diamond pattern.

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A = **over one, under two, over three, under two** and repeat

B = (over two), \* **under two, over one, under two, over three** and repeat from \*

C = **under one, over two, under three, over two** and repeat

D = (under two), \* **over two, under one, over two, under three** and repeat

Weave in this order: **A, B, C, B, A, D** and repeat
