


Historic Heart of the Lammermuirs



Tabby or plain weave

This is the easiest type of weaving, alternating the warp (vertical) and weft (horizontal) yarns to produce a basic woven texture.


- A = Over one, under one and repeat
- B = Under one, over one and repeat
- Alternate rows A and B until you run out of space



Twill weave

Twill **weave** involves going under two warp yarns and then over the next two, and offsetting each following row by one warp yarn to produce a diagonal effect.

- A = under two, over two and repeat
- B = (over one), * under two, over two and repeat from *
- C = over two, under two and repeat
- D = (under one), * over two, under two and repeat from *
- Weave in this order: **A**, **B**, **C**, **D** and repeat



Diamond weave

This is the most complex type of weaving shown here, with four **different** rows, used in a six-row repeat to form a diamond pattern.

- A = over one, under two, over three, under two and repeat
- B = (over two), * under two, over one, under two, over three and repeat from *
- C = under one, over two, under three, over two and repeat
- D = (under two), * over two, under one, over two, under three and repeat

Weave in this order: A, B, C, B, A, D and repeat
